HOMILY HELP

Again and again in his letter, James commands Christians to put faith into action. Today we hear an explicit warning: "Behold, the wages you withheld from the workers who harvested your fields are crying aloud; and the cries of the harvesters have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts" (James 5:4). For us to store up treasure for ourselves while those who do the work that allows us to have such treasure is sinful. Let us imitate the generosity of the Father, as we have seen in so many of Jesus' parables, working toward a world where everyone from migrant workers who literally harvest our nation's fields to those who cannot seem to break out of the cycle of poverty are compensated with a just wage.

TRIBALISM

It is part of Christian doctrine that only Christians can be saved. No one comes to the Father except by Christ (John 14:6). This is a view that can encourage tribalism.

In the Gospel Reading, the apostles see someone who is not among the group of Christ's disciples but who is casting out demons in the name of Christ anyway. When the apostles perceive the man doing a miracle in Christ's name, they tell him to stop it. As the apostles see it, unless a person is a member of their group, their tribe, he is an outsider; and, as an outsider, he is not among the saved. In the view of the apostles, that is why there is something wrong about that outsider's using God's power to do miracles.

In response, Christ defends the outsider and rebukes the tribalism of his apostles. "Whoever is not against us is for us," Christ tells the disciples. The outsider has not joined the disciples, and he doesn't know the doctrines or customs that the disciples are learning from Christ. But, in Christ's view, he is still one of Christ's own.

So, it is true that no one comes to the Father except by Christ.

But this requirement makes Christ the one necessary and sufficient condition for salvation. It doesn't say anything about any of the other ways by which members of a group usually identify themselves. As Christ sees that outsider, the man meets the one requisite condition for salvation: he is for Christ. And so, in Christ's view, that outsider counts as one of those who come to the Father by Christ, even if he is not an official member of Christ's disciples.

But then, you might say, who doesn't count as one of Christ's own? Who actually is against Christ?

In effect, Christ answers these questions by giving an example of a group destined for perdition. It is the group of those who draw children away from the Lord or who make the vulnerable and helpless worse than they otherwise would be. Those in that group would be better off being dropped into the sea with millstones around their necks, Christ says.

So here is what we need to remember. Even Judas was a member of the official tribe of Christ's disciples; but in the end Judas was not one of Christ's own. Real membership in the group of those who are Christ's own depends on being for Christ, and for those he loves. **Eleonore Stump**

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY

We come together today to worship God, to receive our Lord in the Eucharist, to encounter him in each other, and to open ourselves to God's continuing revelation in the word. Today's Gospel is a difficult one, with severe warnings about sin and hell. The second reading isn't much easier to take, warning of the corrosive effects of wealth and pleasure. Let us accept the challenge of taking a good long hard look at our lives and deciding what we need to cut from it in order to remain on the path to the kingdom.

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Moses' loyal lieutenant Joshua and Jesus' beloved disciple John each protest that seemingly undeserving people are acting in the Lord's name. Moses and Jesus both respond by basically saying that the spirit blows where it will and we humans cannot bottle it in. We also hear both James and Jesus warn us of the consequences of sin. May we heed their warnings as we take comfort in the Holy Spirit's presence within us, guiding us in the right ways.

FEASTS AND SOLEMNITIES

ST JEROME – MEMORIAL Monday 30 September

St Jerome (c.342-420). An ascetic and a scholar, ordained priest at Antioch in 379, he went to Constantinople where he and St Gregory Nazianzen became friends. In 382 he moved to Rome, becoming secretary to Pope Damasus and being known for his sanctity, learning and eloquence. He chose to live in Bethlehem in 386 and to complete his writings: letters, treatises, commentaries on Scripture and, especially, the 'Vulgate' translation of the Bible into Latin. He is one of the Fathers of the Church.

Wednesday 2 October (SCHOOL MASS ON THIS DAY) THE HOLY GUARDIAN ANGELS – MEMORIAL

The Holy Guardian Angels: Without being specific regarding details, the Church teaches that God assigns an angel or angels to guard us during our life on earth. The belief illustrates God's providential care for each of us.

Friday 4 October

ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI – MEMORIAL Friday 4 October St Francis of Assisi (1181-1226). Son of a rich Assisi merchant, his early ostentation ceased when, in 1205, he began to devote himself to care of the sick and the poor. Francis chose to renounce his patrimony and live as a hermit in total poverty. His zeal was infectious; soon he had eleven brothers, and he drew up a rule which laid down the basic rules of chastity, poverty and obedience. At his first general assembly, 5000 brothers were present. In 1223, Francis visited Egypt and preached before the sultan.; from this came the special privileges which the Franciscans have, called the 'Custody' of the Holy Land, viz., being guardians of the Holy Sepulchre and other shrines. Through his example and advice, St Clare founded the Franciscan way for women, initially the Poor Clares. Saint Francis was the first to introduce the Christmas crib in churches. He is associated with a love for animals and an esteem for the natural world. He died in 1226, leaving letters, sermons, treaties and hymns.
