THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW

In the Gospel Reading, Christ is being held by Pilate, who holds him in his power. In the next part of the story, as we know, Christ is on the cross: poor, dishonoured, in pain, and dying.

Christ's willingness to accept these afflictions sets the standard for all Christians, and it turns all worldly standards upside down. What most people reject as the worst things in life turns out in Christ's crucifixion to be the prize-winning goods. On the cross Christ makes manifest that real winning is what looks to the world like losing. And vice versa too, of course. There is something small and unworthy about a life lived totally at ease.

That is why Paul says that all things work together for good for those who love God—all things (Rom. 8:28). Our sins are included in that "all things," not just our suffering. When Paul pleaded with God to right then take away a sin of Paul's that Paul was impatient with, God told him, "My grace is sufficient for you." (2 Cor. 12:9).

But now notice in the Second Reading the very different picture of Christ and of the standard of excellence for Christ's people.

The Second Reading shows us Christ not as poor, dishonoured, and suffering but as the king of kings, the most powerful and honoured of all rulers. And it shows us Christ's people in the same way: not as afflicted with Christ-like suffering, but glorious in Christ's kingdom. In that picture, all Christ's people are honoured priests for God, and they are also freed from their sin— not some of their sins, but *all* of them.

So which of these two pictures—of Christ, of Christ's people—should set the standard for us, the goal at which we aim?

The answer, of course, is "Both of them!"

There is a time for suffering, when all worldly values and all earthly desires are turned upside down, a time when we struggle with sin and suffering. But there is also a time when things turn right-side up again and then all struggle ends. At that time, each one of Christ's people will say of every affliction, "That was then; this is now!" Only that "now,"

when all sin and suffering falls away, is an everlasting now.

And the cross is the way to it.

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY

On the final Sunday of the Church year we celebrate Jesus Christ's unique role as ruler over the entire world. He did not become king by conquering other nations, nor by popular acclaim. No, he became king by willingly suffering and dying for our sins and leading us to eternal glory with God. He gave us a glimpse of the kingdom during his earthly life, but we know that he continues to reveal himself in the poor, the weak, and the marginalised; in the Church as we gather in his name; and in the Eucharist we receive and consume each Sunday.

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

In today's first reading, we hear Daniel's vision of a Son of man receiving kingship from God over an eternal dominion. As Christians, we understand this prophecy to be fulfilled in Jesus, who often referred to himself as the Son of Man. We also hear a vision from Revelation in which Jesus comes again in glory. The Gospel narrates the scene in which Jesus is questioned by Pilate about his kingship, which he cannot understand. Let us listen to God's word, aware that Jesus came into the world to testify to the truth.

'The Lord is king, with majesty enrobed.'

Second Reading Apocalypse 1: 5-8

Alleluia, alleluia! Blessings on him who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessings on the coming kingdom of our father David! Alleluia!

Gospel John 18: 33-37 It is you who say that I am a king.

FEASTS AND SOLEMNITIES

Memorial of St Fergus Wednesday 27 November ST ANDREW – SOLEMNITY Saturday 30 November

St Andrew the Apostle is Principal Patron of Scotland. Born in Bethsaida at the Sea of Galilee, he was a follower of John the Baptist before he was a disciple of Christ, to whom he brought Peter, his brother. Along with Philip, he presented some Gentiles to Jesus and, in the gospel, is named as the person who told Jesus about the boy with the loaves and fishes. It is said that he evangelised in Asia Minor and Scythia before being crucified in Achaia, Western Greece. The iconography of the martyrdom of Andrew – showing him bound to an X-shaped cross – does not appear to have been standardised until the later Middle Ages.
